Harvest is from the Anglo-Saxon word haerfest, "Autumn". It then came to refer to the season for reaping and gathering grain and other grown products. An early Harvest Festival used to be celebrated at the beginning of the Harvest season on 1st August, and was called Lammas, "Loaf Mass". Farmers made loaves of bread from the fresh wheat crop. These were given to the local church as the Communion bread during a special service thanking God for the harvest. The focus of this celebration has since shifted to the end of the harvest season, rather than the beginning.

Hymn of the Week: To Thee, O Lord, our hearts we raise...



1 To Thee, O Lord, our hearts we raise in hymns of adoration, to Thee bring sacrifice of praise with shouts of exultation. Bright robes of gold the fields adorn, the hills with joy are ringing, the valleys stand so thick with corn that even they are singing.

2 And now, on this our festal day, Thy bounteous hand confessing, upon Thine altar, Lord, we lay the first-fruits of Thy blessing. By Thee the hungry souls are fed with gifts of grace supernal; Thou who dost give us daily bread, give us the bread eternal.

3 We bear the burden of the day, and often toil seems dreary; but labour ends with sunset ray, and rest comes for the weary. May we, the angel-reaping o'er, stand at the last accepted, Christ's golden sheaves for evermore to garners bright elected.

4 O blessèd is that land of God, where saints abide for ever; where golden fields spread far and broad, where flows the crystal river. The strains of all its holy throng with ours today are blending; thrice blessèd is that harvest-song which never hath an ending.

Theology Corner

This hymn opens by reflecting creation's joyful praise of God's goodness as extolled in Psalm 65 verses 9-13. The "fruit of lips" offering a "sacrifice of praise" is commended in the Letter to the Hebrews (Hebrews 13:15).

Verse 2 alludes to the Festival of Harvest instituted by God in Exodus 23:14-19, requiring the choicest of the first fruits of the ground to be brought into the LORD's House (see also Leviticus 23:10, Deuteronomy 26:1-11). The "daily bread" of the Lord's Prayer gets a mention, but God is also exhorted to give us the bread eternal, of Christ's body in Holy Communion (John 6:35).

Verse 3 reflects the sentiments of the workers in the vineyard, about whom we heard a few weeks back (Matthew chapter 20). But there's the promise of "rest for the weary" (Job 3:17) who bring home the harvest (Psalm 126:6). It then picks up the Parable of the Weeds as explained by Jesus in Matthew 13:36-43, where evildoers end up in the furnace, and the righteous in the kingdom of God.

The last verse reflects the vision of heaven, the experience of being in the nearer presence of God, as revealed to John. There the "crystal river" of the water of life supports the Tree of Life, which brings forth fruitfulness and healing (Revelation 22:1-2). And lastly we have a taste of the eternal worship of God (described in Revelation chapter 4), in which we may also graciously partake during our Eucharistic Prayer - "Holy Holy Holy Lord..." sung to God day and night. Worship which, as the hymn says, "never hath an ending".

We are thoughtless, and do not care enough for the world you have made. Father, in your mercy: *All* **forgive us and help us.** We store up goods for ourselves alone, as if there were no God and no heaven. Father, in your mercy: *All* forgive us and help us.

The priest says the Absolution

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *All* **Amen.**

The Gloria in Excelsis is said:

All Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen

Creator God, you made the goodness of the land, the riches of the sea and the rhythm of the seasons; as we thank you for the harvest, may we cherish and respect this planet and its peoples, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *All* **Amen.**

A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy

Deuteronomy 8.7-18

The LORD your God is bringing you into a good land, a land with flowing streams, with springs and underground waters welling up in valleys and hills, a land of wheat and barley, of vines and fig trees and pomegranates, a land of olive trees and honey, a land where you may eat bread without scarcity, where you will lack nothing, a land whose stones are iron and from whose hills you may mine copper. You shall eat your fill and bless the LORD your God for the good land that he has given you.

Take care that you do not forget the LORD your God, by failing to keep his commandments, his ordinances, and his statutes, which I am commanding you today. When you have eaten your fill and have built fine houses and live in them. and when your herds and flocks have multiplied, and your silver and gold is multiplied, and all that you have is multiplied, then do not exalt yourself, forgetting the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, who led you through the great and terrible wilderness, an arid waste-land with poisonous snakes and scorpions. He made water

flow for you from flint rock, and fed you in the wilderness with manna that your ancestors did not know, to humble you and to test you, and in the end to do you good. Do not say to yourself, 'My power and the might of my own hand have gained me this wealth.' But remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth, so that he may confirm his covenant that he swore to your ancestors, as he is doing today.

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!' When he saw them, he said to them, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Sermon

The Creed

Let us declare our faith in God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

for farmers and agricultural workers, for packers, distributors and managers; as you have so ordered our life that we depend upon each other,

We pray for all engaged in research to safeguard crops against disease, and to produce abundant life among those who hunger and whose lives are at risk. Prosper the work of their hands

and the searching of their minds,

that their labour may be for the welfare of all. Lord of all wisdom:

All hear our prayer.

We pray for governments and aid agencies,

and those areas of the world where there is disaster, drought and starvation. By the grace of your Spirit,

touch our hearts

and the hearts of all who live in comfortable plenty,

and make us wise stewards of your gifts. Lord of all justice:

All hear our prayer.

We pray for those who are ill, remembering those in hospital and nursing homes and all who are known to us... We pray for all who care for them. Give skill and understanding to all who work for their well-being. Lord of all compassion: *All* hear our prayer. We remember those who have died, whom we entrust to your eternal love in the hope of resurrection to new life... Lord of all peace:

All hear our prayer.

We offer ourselves to your service, asking that by the Spirit at work in us others may receive a rich harvest of love and joy and peace. Lord of all faithfulness:

All hear our prayer.

The table is prepared and bread and wine are placed upon it.

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation; you bring forth bread from the earth. *All* **Blessed be God for ever.**

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation; you create the fruit of the vine. *All* **Blessed be God for ever.**

God of grace,

as you are ever at work in your creation, so fulfil your wise and loving purpose in us **The Eucharistic Prayer** and in all for whom we pray, that with them and in all that you have made, your glory may be revealed and the whole earth give praise to you, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *All* **Amen.** The Lord is here *All* **His Spirit is with us.** Lift up your hearts. *All* **We lift them to the Lord.** Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. *All* **It is right to give thanks and praise.**

The Peace is introduced

The harvest of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. *cf Galatians 5.22,23*

Father, we give you thanks and praise through your beloved Son Jesus Christ, your living Word,

through whom you have created all things; who was sent by you in your great goodness to be our Saviour.

as your Son, born of the blessed Virgin, he lived on earth and went about among us; he opened wide his arms for us on the cross;

he put an end to death by dying for us; and revealed the resurrection

by rising to new life;

so he fulfilled your will

and won for you a holy people.

And now we give you thanks because you make us stewards of your creation.

to praise you day by day for the marvels of your wisdom and power.

Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name,

for ever praising you and saying:

All Holy, holy, holy Lord,

God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, we bring before you this bread and and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ:

who, in the same night that he was betrayed,

took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saving:

Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you;

do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you;

this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me

Great is the mystery of faith: All Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again.

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world: rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of Saint John the Evangelist, Saint Peter, Mary the Mother of God, and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever. All Amen.

The Lord's Prayer

Tomorrow, 12th October, we remember Edith Cavell a good saint for NHS workers this year, as she also cared for the sick despite the danger to her own safety.

Edith was a vicar's daughter from Swardeston in Norfolk,

where she was born in 1865. She became a governess, but her heart was for nursing, so she went to train at the London Hospital.

When Edith was 42, she decided to go abroad, and was appointed matron of a large training centre for nurses in Brussels. During the First World War, Edith's nursing school became a Red Cross hospital, and she and her nurses tended wounded soldiers from both German and Allied armies.

Sadly, in 1915, when the Germans began their occupation of Brussels, they took a dim view of Edith's work. But they would have been even more unhappy had they known she was helping to smuggle 200 British soldiers across the border into the Netherlands! The Germans arrested Edith in August 1915, and put her into solitary confinement. They tricked her into confessing to a charge which carried the death penalty. But Edith refused to show either regret at what she had done, or any fear or bitterness towards her captors.

On 11th October 1915, the night before her execution, she told the visiting chaplain: "I am thankful to have had these ten weeks of quiet to get ready. Now I have had them and have been kindly treated here. I expected my sentence and I believe it was just. Standing, as I do, in view of God and eternity, I realise that patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness to anyone."

Edith was shot by a firing squad next day, on 12th October 1915. After the war her body was exhumed and buried in Norwich Cathedral. Her memorial service in Westminster Abbey attracted thousands. A commemorative statue of her stands near Trafalgar Square.
