

HYMN OF THE WEEK: *Breathe on me, Breath of God*, sung by Alison

Edwin Hatch, the writer of this hymn, was a learned academic - a distinguished lecturer in Ecclesiastical History at Oxford, and a Professor of Classics at Trinity College, Quebec. He was presumably used to stringing together sentences full of big words! Yet when it came to expressing his faith, Hatch was described as "simple and unaffected". This hymn is filled with one-syllable words and comprises a simple, heartfelt prayer, but with a profound meaning. In creation, the first human "became a living being" through God the creator's life-giving breath. This hymn is a prayer that the Holy Spirit – the life-giving Breath of God – may cleanse and sanctify our inner life, and set it aglow with divine love.

Sermon

The Nicene Creed

Let us declare our faith in God,
Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

**All We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, seen and unseen.**

**We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,

On 9th August: The Church commemorates Mary Sumner – founder of the Mothers' Union

The Mothers' Union is now more than 140 years old, and numbers more than four million members, doing good work in 83 countries. That is a far cry from the modest circle of prayer for mothers who cared about family life, which is how it all began with a rector's wife, Mary Sumner.

Mary was born in 1828 in Swinton, near Manchester. Mary's father, Thomas Heywood, was a banker and historian. Her mother has been described as a woman of "faith, charm and sympathy", and she held informal 'mothers' meetings' at her home, to encourage local women. Those meetings may well have inspired Mary's later work.

Mary was educated at home, spoke three foreign languages, and sang well. In July 1848 she married George Sumner, son of the Bishop of Winchester, nephew of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and second cousin to William Wilberforce. Mary dedicated herself to raising their three children and supporting her husband's priestly ministry in Old Alresford, by providing music and Bible classes.

When in 1876 Mary's eldest daughter, Margaret, gave birth, Mary was reminded of how challenging she had found the role of motherhood. Soon she decided to hold a meeting to which she invited the local women not only of her own class, but also all the village mothers. Her aim was to bring women together to offer each other prayer and mutual support in their roles as wives and mothers. That meeting at Old Alresford Rectory was the inaugural meeting of the Mothers' Union.

In 1885 the Bishop of Newcastle invited Mary to address a Church Conference, and her passionate speech inspired a number of the women present to go back to their parishes to found mothers' meetings on Sumner's pattern. Soon, the Mothers' Union spread to other dioceses. By 1900 there were 169,000 members. By the time Mary died in 1921, she had seen the MU cross the seas and become an international organisation of prayer and good purpose.



The Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, who chairs the C of E's Covid Recovery Group, has encouraged churches and individuals to continue to take precautions to protect the vulnerable from Covid-19.

She recently said: "Many will welcome the possibilities now before us. However, this is a difficult point in the course of the pandemic. Despite vaccination rates, cases are up, hospital admissions are up and Long Covid remains an ongoing concern. Therefore, our approach needs to be cautious and careful."

"Taking personal responsibility means taking precautions to protect those more vulnerable than we consider ourselves to be. Local church leaders know their communities and their own circumstances, and we will support them making local decisions to keep themselves and their community safe."

Please pray for our own Rector and PCC as they seek to discern the way forward for our worship and activities here at St John's.

Surely harmony and effectiveness shall be the fruit of my hours,


And I shall walk in the pace of the Lord

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
